1.1.1 – Institution has the mechanism for well planned curriculum delivery and documentation. Explain in 500 words

The Curricular Aspects are the backbone of any educational institution. The College is affiliated to Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla and follows the curriculum designed and developed by the affiliating university after long discussions with the teachers of various affiliated colleges and members of Board of Studies of the Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla. The various departments of affiliating University organises workshops on different subjects and discuss about the syllabus and then finalise as per UGC guidelines. The university prepares a Academic Calendar with the consultation of Principals of various colleges of Himachal Pradesh with complete details such as total number

of days in a year, commencement and completion of academic year, examination and evaluation schedule etc. . The principal of the college conducts various staff meetings before commencement of each academic year in which various committees are framed and different assignments are allotted to the faculty members/committees in sequence as per academic calendar of the university. At the beginning of the academic year, college publishes its PROSPECTUS-CUM-HANDBOOK of INFORMATION every year. The PROSPECTUS-CUM-HANDBOOK of INFORMATION contains detailed information of the college such as existing teaching and non-teaching staff with their designations and qualifications, Admission Committee of the current session, General Rules for admission to undergraduate/postgraduate degree/diploma/certificate courses, programmes offered, department wise layout of syllabus of different courses offered by the college, reservation roaster, examination and evaluation system, details of fees and funds, functioning and working of NSS, Rovers and Rangers, Red Ribbon Club, Sports and Curricular activities, Rules and regulations of College Library, Educational Tours, Remedial Coaching Classes, College Magazine "Hamir", Career-Guidance and Placement Cell, Scholarships/Financial Assistance, Code of Conduct, Annual Committees, Structured College Annual Calendar, Anti-Ragging Rules etc. The college prepares exhaustive Annual Academic Calendar to ensure timely and effective completion of the syllabus as per notices and circulars received from the affiliating University and Department of Higher Education, Govt. of Himachal Pradesh. IQAC of college prepares an action plan for the academic year. The principal ensures strict adherence to the schedule during the entire session. The institution makes sure that the programs offered in the curriculum include contribution to the national development, inculcate a value system among students and promote the use of technology for the excellence. The institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process. Apart from conventional method of teaching, teachers are encouraged to implement the curriculum through innovative teaching methods such as power point presentations, assignments, discussion, seminars, tutorials, class test, field trips, maps and models etc. A mid-term test (MTT) is conducted to assess the students. The Internal Assessment is given on the basis of this test, assignment and the attendance record of the students. Finally, the End Semester Exams (ESE) is conducted by H. P. University, Shimla. Students are provided with the facility of library to find their study material through text books, reference books, journals, magazines, newspapers etc. For the overall development of the students, the IQAC organizes various academic activities viz. Seminars, Conferences, Invited Lectures on different topics, Workshops etc.

2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

Since its establishment in 1965, N.S.C.B.M. Degree college, Hamirpur has been tirelessly working towards ensuring the holistic development of its students and thus student mentoring system is an integral part of our institution. The session commences with a mandatory orientation session for building a strong mentor-mentee relationship in which the teachers apprise the students regarding the respective courses opted for and also make the students familiar with functioning along with general rules and regulations of the college. Besides this, the personal counseling and mentoring is done by the subject teacher throughout the session outside the class hours for both academic and personal growth of the student. Mentoring Remedial classes are also there for slow learning students to cope up with the demands of the courses of their choice. Students are encouraged to participate in group discussions, peer group presentations, additional reference material and counselling is provided to bring them at par with rest of the students. Besides the course study, students are also encouraged to enroll in various societies and clubs of the college such as NCC, NSS, Red Ribbon Club, Eco Club, Rovers and Rangers. Active participation of staff and students is ensured in camps organized by these bodies in which community outreach programmes enhance the oral communication, decision making skills of the students and also help to develop sensitivity towards the disadvantaged groups of the society. Besides these, students are also encouraged to sign up for cultural and sports activities. The institute has an unparalleled facility of synthetic track and indoor Stadium for providing . The college boasts of being a regular winner of various cultural activities at HPU inter-college level youth festivals. Also the college ensures organization of various co-curricular and extra-curricular activities at college level throughout the year to encourage talent, hone organizational skills of the students ,to promote team work among them. The college also organizes many International/ National/Regional workshops /seminars /conferences on contemporary issues. Guest Lectures by the eminent academicians and other prominent personalities of their respective fields are also organized to provide a wider perspective to the students. In pusuit of further improving student learning process, projects work,report writing, group discussion,assignments, brainstorming educational/industrial visits, industrial training and internship programmes is taken up. In addition to conventional teaching and learning aids, students also are encouraged to utilise various e – resources like e-books,e-journals, e-pathshala, in Swayam and other MOOC platforms. A dedicated Career Counselling and guidance cell works round the year for acquainting the students with all the possible opportunities for higher studies and job after the completion of their respective courses.

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2.5.2 – Reforms initiated on Continuous Internal Evaluation(CIE) system at the institutional level (250 words)

Continuous evaluation is an important component in assessing students. In the beginning of session, an orientation program is conducted by the teachers for fresh students to appraise them of all academic aspects including evaluation process. College prospectus which is updated and published in the beginning of academic year is given to all the admitted students which clearly describes the evaluation process of the courses. The evaluation's criteria for each course comprises one mid-term examination, class tests, assignments, viva-voce, lab-work, project reports, and seminars etc. As per university norms we are bound to conduct one mid-term test along with the class tests. Second test is also conducted for those students who could not attend the previous tests for valid reasons. Learning outcomes are also measured through other parameters such as – student's regularity in attending classes, their participation in class room lectures, regularity in submission of assignments etc. Teachers give due attention to the students by conducting revision lectures, organizing class seminars and group discussions. The question papers for the comprehensive mid-term examinations are set by the respective class teachers and after the evaluation of the scripts, these are shown to students so that they can check their mistakes and can improve for final examination. After the evaluation of any components of continuous comprehensive assessment, students can get access to their results. Internal assessment is prepared by the subject teacher and uploaded on the University website.

Every year under the guidance of the IQAC and Himachal Pradesh University, prepare our own academic calendar. Due attention is given to incorporate academic activities and other supporting activities so as to reflect the goals and objectives of the College. Preparation and adherence to the academic calendar ensures timely completion of syllabus, inclusion of extracurricular activities, sports events, timely conduct and completion of mid-term examinations. Academic calendar helps students to finalize their plans regarding their studies and their participation in extracurricular activities which adds on to their holistic development. It is included in the calendar that at the end of each semester /session, examinations will be conducted and evaluation

will be carried out by the university. The exam results are declared and grade cards are issued by the H. P. University. Being a government institution, we have to fulfil codal formalities according to government norms set by the HP State govt. The HP Government has clearly established the procedures, rules and regulations for the maintenance of infrastructure. According to government norms, the maintenance is undertaken by the HPPWD department or BSNL department. The institute has various sources of funds like UGC funds, funds of the college like Building fund, amalgamated fund, sport fund, PTA Fund etc. and Funds collected by Self-financing courses.

This institution has a healthy practice of decentralization and participative management. In this regard different committees are constituted i.e. time table committee, IQAC research promotion committee, midterm and house examination committee, library affairs and purchase committee, college development and construction monitoring committee, water and electricity committee, college prospectus committee, career guidance and scholarship committee etc. These committees consist of one senior faculty as convener and members. These committees execute the assignment after observing all the codal formalities. These committees are constituted in such a manner that a representation of faculties of various departments is ensured. This enables the administration to get a feedback from all the departments and the problems/ requirements/issues are deliberated upon and with the consultation of Principal and final decisions are taken. This further enables the administration to distribute the resources evenly keeping in view the stake holders of the institution As per the

recommendations of Lyngdoh committee and rules regulations of Himachal Pradesh University, College Students Central Association (CSCA) is nominated for each academic session. The CSCA comprises of office bearer i.e. President, Vice President, Secretary, Joint Secretary and members representing all classes and faculties. The student body helps the college administration to maintain congenial academic atmosphere in the campus. This nominated association from time to time raises issues relating to the interest and welfare of the students before the college administration. The nominated student leaders remain proactive in maintaining discipline in the campus. In order to check the menace of drug abuse (Drug Free Institution) this platform of student is very helpful to the college administration. Apart from this, anti ragging squads consisting of teachers and students (CSCA) are formed and different time slots and areas are allocated to them keeping in view the availability and time table. Research and Development	We have specific research curriculum in the syllabus, viz. M. Com, BBA and B. Voc. etc. Students take the benefits of internet installed in the institution and other facilities available in the library. The institution does not have any specific research centre, however IQAC and Career Guidance cell facilitate and monitor the research activities and provide all type of help to the teachers and others. There is provision of duty leaves up to 14 days to teachers in the academic session for attending seminars/conferences/workshops etc. The study leave up to 2 years is also permissible to the teachers by H.P. Govt. for higher studies. During the year 2019-20 one faculty member was awarded for Ph. D. It is further added that during the Year one international

seminar cum webinar, one international conference, one national seminar, one state level Seminar and four weeks workshop were organized.

Examination and Evaluation

Examination and Evaluation The institution informs the students and faculty regarding examination evaluation process through the detailed information incorporated in the college prospectus. University question papers of previous years are kept in college library for the students to get idea of the style and type of questions. All the important information, changes in evaluation process and new guidelines in this direction from the HP University and the Department of Higher Education are discussed in staff and departmental meetings to apprise the faculty members from time to time. Since 2013, after the adoption of RUSA the semester system came into existence. Since 2018 again annual system has been implemented by the affiliating university. In the annual system the evaluation of students comprise of End Semester Examination and Internal Assessment. The awards of internal assessment are based on three components viz. attendance, midterm test and assignments/seminars etc. according to a well defined matrix. The performance of the students in midterm exams is shared with the parents in PTA meetings. Students are informed about the internal assessment marks to maintain transparency and to provide to students feedback about their performance.

Teaching and Learning

Teaching and Learning An exhaustive coverage of syllabus, providing students background and current information related to curriculum topics, active class participation by students, regular feedback of students by asking questions, organizing students seminars and group discussions are the hallmarks of the teaching-learning strategies of the college. The institution adheres to the academic calendar as notified by the Department of Higher Education of Government of Himachal Pradesh for each academic session. Besides this, institution also prepares its own annual calendar of activities. The college follows the syllabi and curriculum framed by the HP University.

The syllabus for each course is covered well in time. Our institution recognizes the diverse learning abilities of students and, therefore, adopts student centric pedagogic approach to make teaching more encompassing and effective. Teachers of the institution have the provision of attending various induction/training/orientation/refresher/workshop programmes to update their teaching techniques and get upraised about the latest trends of teaching and learning. Our institution strives to evolve an environment conducive to nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper. Various activities such as poster making, collage making etc. are organized to inculcate the habit of critical thinking among students. Also the college magazine provides a platform to nurture their Creativity. Based on the performance, students are identified as slow learners and advanced learners. Special efforts are made for the slow learners. The college makes full use of modern teaching aids at its disposal for the benefits of the students. The college is having a well stocked library with comprehensive collection of text books, reference books periodicals etc. and the INFLIBINET codes are provided to the faculty members to exploit the web resources. College organizes spoken English and personality development classes for the students as to enrich their communication skill. House and class examinations are conducted by the college as per the schedule mentioned in the academic calendar. University examinations are conducted by the college as per the schedule provided by the affiliating university.

Curriculum Development

The college follows the curriculum devised by the Himachal Pradesh University , Shimla. The institution, being an affiliated college to Himachal Pradesh University, Shimla does not have the freedom of formulating its own curriculum. However, the senior most Associate/Assistant Professors being the members of the Board of Studies (BoS) are involved in framing and developing the curriculum in accordance with the recent societal requirements. The Principal of the institution monitors the implementation of

curriculum with the help of the head of the departments or holding staff meetings. The heads conduct meetings of faculties of respective departments and communicate the teaching plan to their faculty members. The heads of the departments go ahead with the inputs from the faculty. The time table is framed by the committee for the whole academic session.

Library, ICT and Physical Infrastructure / Instrumentation

Library, ICT and Physical The college is making constant efforts to get grants for infrastructure maintenance and development. Library: The college is having a well Infrastructure / Instrumentation stocked library with comprehensive collection of text books, reference books, periodicals, journals, etc. Presently, the college library has installed SOUL-2.0 (Software for University Library) which is a state-of-the-art integrated library management software designed and developed by the INFLIBINET centre based on requirements of college and university libraries. Library automation process has been completed and bar coding of the books has been done. New books purchased : 304, Newspaper Subscribed : 11 ,Journals Subscribed: 07, Magazines Subscribed: 22. ICT and physical infrastructure/instrumentation: The institution has developed and upgraded ICT infrastructure to meet emerging future global challenges. In the context of physical infrastructure up to 2015, there were 5 academic blocks having 17 lecture rooms, 18 labs, 18 lecture theaters and 22 faculty rooms in this institution. In this session, One Big Indoor Stadium Building, Newly constructed Hall in the basement of existing Library building and College Stage with Covered Shed have been added to the existing infrastructure. One PG lab for the department of Chemistry has become functional and the process to start PG classes is underway. Two PG labs for the department of Botany and Zoology renovated into modular labs in this session.

Human Resource Management

Human Resource Management The college is switching over to HRM and the data of all faculty members is centrally digitalized under MIS for handling issues like transfer, disbursement of

salary and other official matters. The Himachal Pradesh Government is very proactive with regard to quality human resources. The qualified teachers are appointed through Himachal Pradesh Public Service Commission at all India level competition. The Government not only appoints quality teachers but also endeavours to retain quality teachers by providing various monetary incentives. The college also ensures upgradation and updating of quality teachers by arranging regular faculty development programmes. The teachers update themselves by regularly attending Refresher courses/conferences/seminars/workshops. Non-teaching staff is also appointed through competition through Himachal Pradesh Staff Selection Commission. UGC scales are implemented for the faculty.

The Career Guidance and Counseling Cell of the college acts as a bridge between the educational institution and the industrial requirements. Recruiting/placement agencies invited in the college apprise the students about the hard and soft skill industrial demands. Experts from various areas are invited in the college to share their knowledge and experience with the students. Training programmes are organized for the students of vocational courses in collaboration with institutions of hospitality, retail management, tourism etc.
